

Law and Society Interdisciplinary Program

Courses, Requirements, and 2012-2013 Schedule

The Law and Society Program offers courses, speakers, and events that emphasize the complexity and interrelationship of legal, social, and ethical issues in their historical context. The interdisciplinary minor offers students the opportunity to examine the role of the legal system in society and to study specific legal issues from the perspectives of the social sciences and the humanities. Students benefit from the program by learning how to analyze and understand the legal implications and ramifications of policy and decision making.

MINOR REQUIREMENTS

- The minor consists of seven courses, of which at least five must be upper-division. Upper-division courses must not overlap with courses taken for a major.
 - No more than two courses (eight units) may be taken with a pass/no pass grading option.
- To ensure an interdisciplinary learning experience, students must take at least one course from each of the following academic departments: History, Philosophy, Political Science, and Sociology.
